Did you know?

Though formally established as a universal day of prayer and solidarity for the missions in 1922, the World Mission Sunday collection finds its origin in the prayer circles created by Blessed Pauline Jaricot, the foundress of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, one of four Pontifical Mission Societies. This 19th-century French laywoman convinced her friends, many of whom were laborers in her family’s silk factory, to pray daily for the missions and give a penny a week.

The pennies raised during the first year were sent to the huge then-diocese of Louisiana, which extended from the Florida Keys throughout the Louisiana Purchase to the Canadian border, and to China.

Dear Faithful in Christ,

Every once in a while, people will ask me for information about some book or essay I have referred to in my sermon. I'll take this opportunity to talk about one book I've referred to on at least a few occasions.

Your Designed Body is by Steve Laufmann and Howard Glicksman, MD, the latter of whom is a convert to Catholicism. The book was published in 2022 by the Discovery Institute.

Laufmann is an engineer and Glicksman is a medical doctor. They both draw on their areas of expertise to illustrate and explain the intricate design of the human body and some of its systems. These systems require so many collaborative parts that it is not possible to build them "step by step," and they provide strong evidence that they have been designed by a highly intelligent mind. Indeed, some of the systems and workings that occur in the human body are *beyond* any engineering we currently have in the world.

The book is very well written and clear. You do not need a background in biology or physiology in order to understand it. It is also very admirable in its tone; it never sinks to name-calling and vituperation, which those on the other side sometimes do. I believe this book should be accessible to a bright high school student or above.

There is an especially interesting discussion with a diagram of the development of an embryo. It becomes clear that an embryo is a human being right from the start.

If you read it, be sure to let me know what you think. God bless.
